Dianne Parmelee leaves an indelible mark! by Arthur Milnor

Dianne Parmelee represents much of what Flanders is all about today, and certainly much of what Flanders was about at its founding in 1963. Reflecting further, it seems Dianne was somehow inextricably linked to Flanders founder, Natalie Van Vleck (NVV) . . . perhaps even channeling her a little over the years.

Both NVV and Dianne were passionate, fiercely independent, and hard-working women. Both possessed abundant artistic gifts and were admired for their varied creative talents. Both were in tune to the unique opportunities of melding the varied worlds of farming, nature and art into a flourishing Flanders Nature Center. Both inspired scores of children and families.

Like NVV, Dianne was inspired by the natural world. While NVV's artistic path steered toward painting, woodwork, and

carved frames, Dianne preferred the arts and crafts and life's lessons she imagined or gleaned from the study of nature. She concocted imaginative children's stories, and often wrote, directed and performed in magical Flanders productions like the Fairy Festivals and Haunted Hikes. Her gorgeous holiday wreaths, assembled from scratch with collected natural gatherings, were legendary. And during interpretive classes, she merrily and with purpose went about her ways of passing along time-honored rural traditions from generation to generation.

Dianne's first love, however, might have been the farm, raising animals, and putting her fingers deep into the heart of the land. Perhaps like Natalie, farming stirred something deep in her soul. Under Dianne's tutelage everyone seemed eager and interested to learn. She was a gifted

teacher holding reign over school children, 4-H volunteers, and families who came out to visit the animals, to understand life on a working farm, or learn about the wonders of nature.

Like Natalie, she understood the intrinsic value Flanders Nature Center & Land Trust would have in the minds and hearts of visitors from throughout the region. And like Natalie she will be missed, but she could never be forgotten. There was a creative energy about Dianne that beckoned, and her persona could be loosely defined as a wonderful combination of Mary Poppins and the Piped Piper.

Dianne left an indelible mark . . . for who she was, all she accomplished, and most importantly, for passing the torch of enchantment and enlightenment from one generation to the next.

Alexander Thomson Retires After 15 Years of Service as Land Manager



Alex Thomson's first introduction to Flanders came in the mid-sixties, when his parents enrolled him in a summer program. Though memories are faint, he recalls standing near the old barn across from the Van Vleck house.

By 2000, he had joined the education committee at Flanders, hosting meetings at Nonnewaug High School where he taught Ag Mechanics and later directed the Ag Program. From those meetings came his role leading wagon rides at Flanders festivals—something he continued at many events for years.

Newly retired after a 30-year teaching career and decades of farm work, he shifted into a small haying operation and was invited by then-Director Arthur Milnor to take on maintenance at Flanders. His early tasks ranged from mowing and winterizing buildings to snow removal and even beaver management. As responsibilities grew, he brought in Ag students to help and supplied equipment from his farm. Together, they built annual safety and maintenance programs that remain in place today.

The Thomson family's ties to Flanders run deep. His paternal grandmother was close friends with Natalie Van Vleck, and his maternal grandmother's Junior League helped fund the Trail House project in the 1960s.

Retiring with 15 years of invaluable service as Flanders' Land Manager, Alex receives accolades from Flanders' staff, volunteers, and community partners. Alex's wife of 41 years, Janet, has been his greatest supporter and now volunteers at Flanders as well. As he transitions responsibilities to a new team member, he expects to stay involved a while longer . . . When asked about his "last day," he replied with a smile: "Probably a year or two from now. Retirement is just changing jobs." We're all glad, as this means we'll see Alex around and enjoy his words of wisdom and common sense.

This program is designed to immerse participants in information, ideas, and inspiration on how to design sustainable, regenerative systems for your home and property. This course will be taught by environmental experts from the Northwest Conservation District.

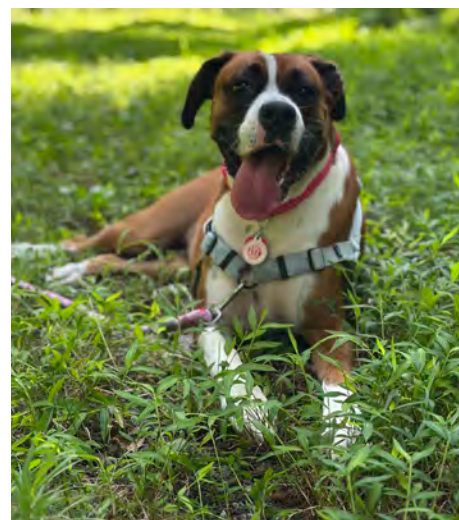

Children & Youth Programs



Grade-level Next Generation Science Standards-Aligned Programs

Flanders offers an exceptional collection of field-based K-5 learning experiences to complement the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). These 2-hour immersive programs are fun, engaging, and authentic in a classroom of nature's design.

Our middle school field trips are 2.5 hours in length, and can be offered at the high school level as well.

KINDERGARTEN

Animals & Where They Live

Students visit farm animals and look for patterns in animal needs. They visit woodlands and learn that wild animals have similar needs. Students record observational data and recognize relationships between what animals need and where they live. NGSS Performance Expectations: K-LS1-1, KESS2-2, K-ESS3-1. Livestream version also available.

Beavers Change Their Environment (Grades K–2)

Through evidence collection in a beaver habitat, students learn about beavers' survival needs and how altering their environment allows them to meet those needs. They describe the features of a beaver and relate structure to function. NGSS Performance Expectations: K-LS1-1, K-ESS2-2, K-ESS3-1, K-2-ETS1-2, 1-LS1-1, 2-LS4-1 Livestream and in-school versions also available.

GRADE 1

Animals and Their Parts (Grades 1–2)

Visiting a variety of farm animals, students relate the structure of animal parts to their function. They apply these concepts to wild animals in an observation and discussion of taxidermy mounts, and then analyze examples of biomimicry. NGSS Performance Expectations: 1-LS1-1, K-2-ETS1-2. Livestream and in-school versions also available.

Nest Nurseries (Grades 1–2)

Nest building is a way parents help offspring survive. Students go on a scavenger hunt in a forest for different kinds of nests. In groups, they design and build a nest and then compare designs. They observe patterns in parental care and recognize relationships between nest structure and function. NGSS Performance Expectations: 1-LS1-2, 1-LS3-1, K-2-ETS1-2, K-2-ETS1-3

GRADE 2

Habitat Comparison (Grades 2–3)

Students visit a forest and a pond habitat, collecting, observing and recording the diversity of life in each. They analyze graphic models of their class data, then participate in an analysis discussion. NGSS Performance Expectation: 2-LS4-1, 3-LS4-3. Livestream and in-school versions, including a Grade 3 version focusing on life cycles are available.

Pollination: Animals and Plants Depending Upon Each Other (GRADES 2-3)

Students learn the conditions needed for plants to grow, and how plants are dependent upon animals, such as bees, to reproduce. They plant sunflower seeds to use for further investigation in the classroom. Seasonally, they visit a pollinator habitat and collect data on the diversity and abundance of pollinators, or visit Flanders beekeeping area and learn



about the hive systems and about the ongoing care the bees need. Students organize and discuss their data and observations as a group. NGSS Performance Expectations: 2-LS2-2, 2-LS2-1, 2-LS4-1, 3-LS1-1 (2 hours)

Follow the Water! Making Maps from Pond to Stream to Wetland

Maps show where landforms and bodies of water are in an area and how they relate to each other. Students develop mapping skills and their spatial thinking by producing their own maps, showing the route that water takes on the Van Vleck property and the spatial relationship of three different aquatic habitats. NGSS Performance Expectations: 2-ESS2-2, 2-ESS2-3

GRADE 3

A Tree to Be. Life Cycles and Inheritance

Students learn that trees have life cycles, and that each stage of life has a role in the forest. They find evidence of inheritance and variation by comparing mature and sapling leaves. They then visit a forest ecosystem and measure several trees to determine stages of growth. They analyze class data and make inferences about the health of the forest. NGSS Performance Expectations: 3-LS1-1, 3-LS3-1. **In-School version available.**

NEW! A Tree to Be—Maple Syrup Season!

Students learn about the life cycle of the sugar maple tree, how it compares to their own, and during which stage of life the trees are tapped in maple syrup season. Students visit a forest and measure trees to determine which are tappable, then visit the Sugar House to see

how maple syrup is made and have a taste of the final product! **This field trip is offered in February and March.** NGSS Performance Expectations: 3-LS1-1, 3-LS3-2, 3-ESS2-1.

GRADE 4

Watch that Slope! Stream Bank Erosion (Grades 4–5)

Students study soil erosion, factors that affect it, and its effects on streams and stream organisms. An engaging role-play is followed by fair test demonstrations using stream bank models. At a nearby stream, students examine bank sites, measure % slope of each, and draw conclusions about erosion vulnerability. NGSS Performance Expectations: 4-ESS2-1, 3-5-ETS1-3. **Live stream and in-school versions available.**

Beaver Behavior and Survival

With a combination of slides, video and a visit to a beaver habitat, this program will help students gain an understanding of beavers and how their internal parts and senses work together with their external parts to meet survival needs. NGSS Performance Expectations: 4-LS1-1, 4-LS1-2. **Live stream version also available.**

NEW! Maple Syrup, The Big Picture (Grades 4–5)

At the Flanders Sugar House, students learn about maple syrup production and what is special about the Sugar Maple tree. In teams, they hike to a forested area, where their challenge is to identify which of several tagged trees are Sugar Maples, measure their diameters, and determine which are 'tappable'. They discuss what exchanges occur between the maple tree and the rest of the ecosystem including

in the process of photosynthesis. **This field trip is offered in February and March.** 4-LS1-1, 5-ESS2-1, 5-PS3-1, 5-LS1-1, 5-LS2-1

GRADE 5

Wetlands, a System of Interconnected Spheres

Wetland ecosystems illustrate the interconnectedness of earth's hydrosphere, biosphere, geosphere and atmosphere. Visit Flanders wetlands, collect water samples and document plant and animal life. They conduct water analysis tests, make conclusions about the health of the wetlands based upon the data they collected. NGSS Performance Expectations: 5-ESS2-1, 5-LS2-1

Energy Transfer in a Pond Ecosystem

Students study the food web structure of a Flanders pond. They collect samples of pond organisms, then separate out, identify, and count each type. They collect similar data for pond plant species. Students then use provided references to construct possible food web structures that model the flow of energy through the ecosystem. NGSS Performance Expectations: 5-PS3-1, 5-LS2-1

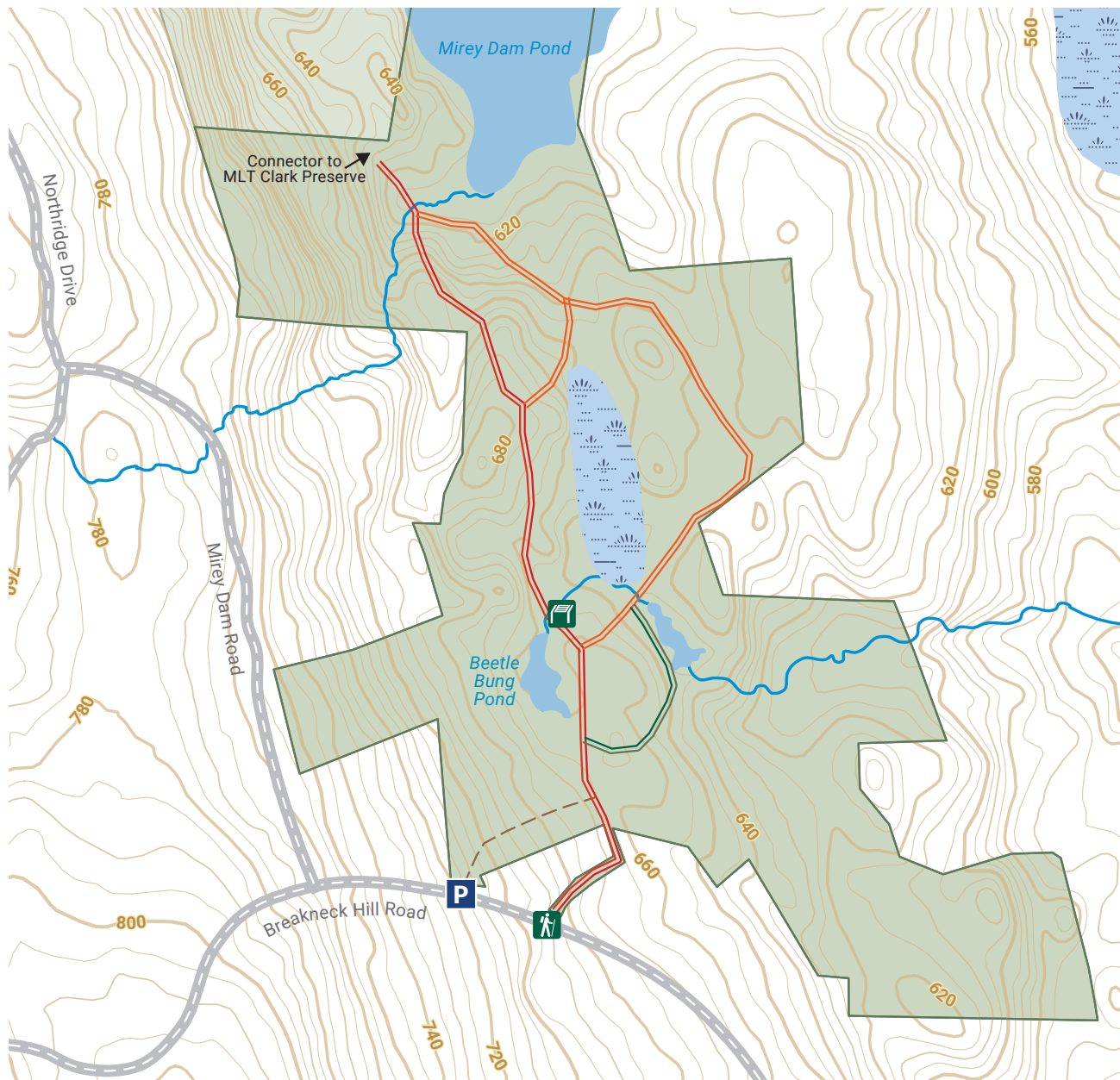

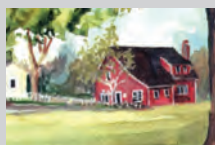
